The intent of this report is to provide a brief summary of the fire department's duties and responsibilities that were provided for the community of Lake Havasu City over the past year. 

2007 Accomplishments & Milestones



The department took delivery of a medium rescue truck in April that was purchased with a grant through Homeland Security. Now loaded with equipment, also purchased with the grant, the unit is available to respond to natural and manmade disasters in Arizona through the state's mutual aid agreement. The truck will also be used on rescue assignments within the city and will be staffed by personnel trained in technical rescue.

The Lake Havasu City Fire Department received official word that we have been approved as a BLS training center by the Arizona Department of Health Services – Bureau of Emergency Medical Services. This achievement means that the department has the authority to train our EMTs without involvement from any other outside entities such as MCC or Wizard Education to provide the recertification course. Typical tuition for these types of recertification courses range from \$200-\$350 per student. All in-house classes were conducted onduty eliminating any overtime wages while maintaining coverage of the city.



In conjunction with the Lake Havasu City Convention & Visitors Bureau, members of the Fire Department took part in the 2007 Fiesta Bowl Parade along with Police Department representatives and other members of our community.



♦ March 2007, the Fire Department, with help from a grant from ADEQ, again headed up the annual Household Hazardous Waste Day where over 51,000 pounds of waste was collected, and a total of 766 vehicles passed through the waste collection station. The event also was supported by All American Battery, Amerigas Propane Parts/Svs Inc., The Lake Havasu City Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), River Cities Waste Services, and Tire Mart, Inc.



In April, the fire department took delivery of our new Munson fire/ rescue boat that was purchased with a State Lake Improvement Funds grant from Arizona State Parks. The new boat replaces an older boat purchased with a SLIF grant 10 years ago. The boat is manned Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends, 4th of July and during other special events. It was christened on April 28, when assigned to its first duty.

A Student Cadet Program was begun to introduce local high school students to a career in the fire service and to help them make the transition to a firefighter.



An automatic CO monitoring system was installed in the Channel. The system was up and running in time for the Labor Day weekend.
